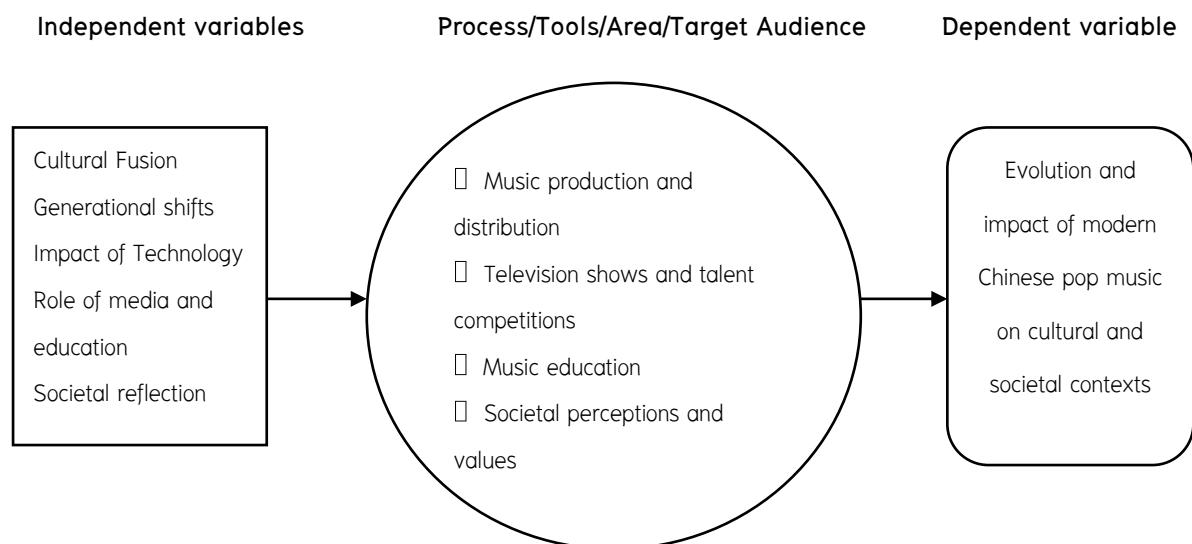


Fig.1 Conceptual Framework

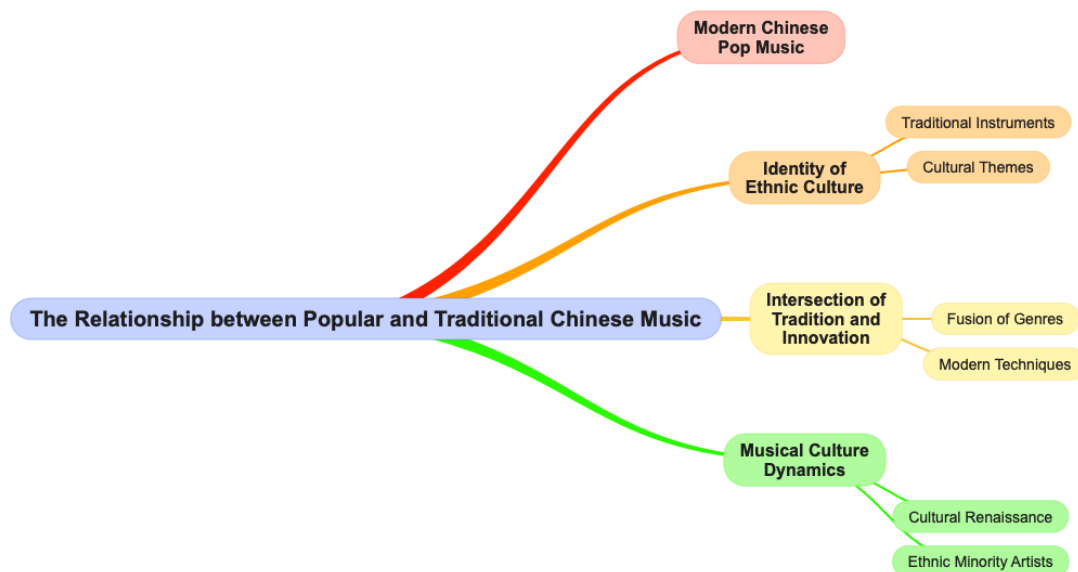


Fig.2 Synthesis of Research Findings

To further advance our understanding of modern Chinese pop music, future studies should focus on three key areas: Cultural Dynamics and Globalization, examining the interplay between traditional Chinese musical elements and contemporary global influences, including regional variations within the genre; Digital Media's Influence, exploring the profound impact of digital platforms on shaping music trends and distribution, as well as the role of innovations like AI and VR in the music industry; and Socio–Political Dynamics and Cultural Identity, analyzing how government policies and social issues influence thematic content and individual identities within Chinese pop music, particularly among younger generations.

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
